Dear Bridge Builders,

Spring is a time for planting, gardening, and blooming. Our Bridge Builders are "gardeners of heart" working together with our refugee families to foster a sense of belonging to American terra ferma.

In 2021, we will double the families we mentor and sponsor helping them bridge the gap towards independence. BPB's stewardship is evident in its Bridge Builder's daily volunteering. We welcomed nine new volunteers to the BPB family and will continue to recruit.

BPB continues to voice its support of social and economic justice for refugees entering the U.S. As our Co-Founder, Ahlam Mahmood stated "I came to the realization that refugees leave one war for another. No bombs, no army, but it is survival nonetheless. Getting the basics – food, clothing, and shelter – without the language and knowledge of the culture, are the new battles. Even having skills or education are not enough if you don't know how to navigate this new land. I do not want refugees to experience what I went through."

A critical objective for BPB in 2021 is Affordable Housing for refugees. As we on-board our new refugee families please watch for Call to Action requests for rental assistance. The average refugee pays 80% of their budget towards rent. BPB is working with Refugee Action Network (RAN) and Illinois Representatives to improve housing policies.

We are proud to announce that Ahlam is a semifinalist of Forbes Magazine and 50 Over 50 Know Your Value initiative. Forbes and 50 Over 50 are committed to shining a light on 50 diverse women over the age of 50 who have achieved significant success later in life, often by overcoming formidable odds or barriers.



We are looking forward to seeing you at two upcoming events. BPB's Reading Refuge Book Club, April 28, *A Disappearance in Damascus*. At the Spring Learning Luncheon, May 17, we welcome Marianne Gimon, The Flora Family Foundation member, speaking about "Refugee Camp Life."

Learning Luncheon

BPB welcomed Congressman Brad Schneider, March 22nd in a discussion of proposed reforms of the U.S. Immigration Policy 2021 and beyond.

Congressman Schneider (D) is a fourth-term representative for the 10th District of Illinois. He has made international affairs a staple of his policies, specifically immigration rights, as evidenced by his membership in the Congressional Refugee Caucus. Together with other members of Congress, he works to ensure "protection, humanitarian needs, and compassionate treatment of refugees". Within the House of Representatives, he is an official cosponsor of the U.S. Citizenship Act of 2021.

Schneider explained the Biden administration's effort to reallocate the funding for building a wall to "technology and other resources" to strengthen border security. The treatment of children at the border was addressed. One question was in regards to refugee resettlement where many refugee flights

had been canceled and what can be done to resettle refugees who have been vetted. He promised to follow-up on this issue. Another question was what are the ways to address the root cause of migration? The congressman discussed eliminating the drivers of migration and providing safe communities and opportunities for vulnerable populations. Another topic was engaging in conversations with people of different views, meeting them where they are and having realistic expectations.


Congressman Schneider reaffirmed that the Biden Administration is working to resolve some immigration issues. He encouraged us to reach out to our representatives and continue advocating for refugees. Please direct your questions to your representative through this website.


Board Transitions

"After the Last Border" By Jessica Goudeau; The inaugural BPB Bookclub

Reading Refuge

BPB launched our inaugural 'Reading Refuge' Book Club on February 24th. BPB welcomed Dr. Jessica Goudeau who led our discussion about her book, *After the Last Border: Two Families and the Story of Refuge in America*.

After the Last Border is a story of two refugee families and their hope and resilience as they fight to survive and belong in America. It situates the dramatic, character-driven story about Mu Naw (a Christian woman from Myanmar) and Hasna (a Muslim woman from Syria) within the larger historical context of modern refugee resettlement in the United States. The book reveals not just how America's changing attitudes toward refugees has influenced policies and laws, but also the profound effect on human lives.

Dr. Goudeau read a segment from her book where one of the characters, Hasna, realized she had to leave Syria. One question that the attendees had was why the author chose women to be the main characters? Dr. Goudeau explained that both women overcame barriers in a patriarchal society and they were the best at recalling events. She added that they arrived in the U.S. at different times and had varying experiences. Dr. Goudeau's goal for her book is that it'll be a way for Americans to immerse themselves in the story and learn about the refugee experience in hopes of creating a more welcoming society.

This discussion reaffirmed the importance of the work done by BPB Bridge Builders and other nonprofits who are dedicated to mentoring and sponsoring refugee families. We encourage you to share her book in your community to spread awareness about the experiences of refugees.


